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Executive Summary

The Dissemination Work Package of SpicE aimed to establish and nurture a Community of Practice, to produce a comprehensive and viable Dissemination plan including project visual identity. It also focused on creating and maintaining the project website as a focal point for project information, producing dissemination material (leaflets, articles, papers, social media communication etc.), as well as recommendations for policy makers and education and training organizations. Lastly, it involved actions for organizing events at local, national and international level.

This report presents the dissemination material produced and used by all project partners. ReadLab was responsible for developing the leaflets, brochures and monitoring the creation of dissemination videos. The goal of the material was to establish a unique framework for project partners to utilize these materials and maximize the project's visibility and engagement. Specifically, ReadLab produced multilingual leaflets, a short promotional video subtitled in all consortium languages and coordinated the development of testimonial videos featuring teachers who participated in the training program.



Introduction

The portfolio of dissemination material, with its cohesive visual identity, plays a key role in enhancing the clarity and impact of the project's messages. Visual elements—such as style, form, and color—help distinguish and personalize the project, making it easily recognizable and memorable. In EU-funded projects, a strong and consistent visual identity is vital for effective dissemination, which involves sharing project results with stakeholders and the broader public. Dissemination is critical not only for visibility but also for ensuring the uptake and long-term sustainability of the project's outputs. ReadLab has also strictly followed the EU guidelines for dissemination, ensuring that the EU emblem and funding disclaimer are consistently and clearly displayed across all communication materials.

ReadLab designed the SpicE project flyer, which was adapted and utilized by project partners to support the promotion and dissemination of the initiative. The flyer provides all the essential information needed for individuals unfamiliar with the project, offering a clear and accessible overview. At the top section, it features the logos of all partners, outlines the project's target groups, and presents its core approach.

The bottom page of the flyer highlights the main outcomes of the project, offering insight into its impact and objectives. It also emphasizes the project's alignment with EU priorities through the inclusion of the EU emblem and funding disclaimer. With its consistent visual identity and a clear call to action, the flyer functions both as an informative resource and a communication tool, encouraging stakeholders to connect with the project via its website and social media platforms.

The flyer has been translated into the three national languages represented within the consortium —Spanish, Bulgarian, and Greek— ensuring that key information is accessible to all partners and their local communities.




Image 9 - SpicE Promo video

The SpicE Inclusive STEAM Education Handbook

This book is the legacy of SpicE project, as it provides a thorough explanation of the key insights and outputs developed throughout the SpicE project. SpicE book set out with two clear aims: first, to showcase the benefits of STEAM education for addressing the unique needs of students with mild disabilities; second, to provide guidance on the skills and competencies primary education teachers need to manage inclusive STEAM classrooms, as well as on the training needed to achieve that. Drawing on the findings generated from SpicE research, the book begins to fill an important gap in current literature, who often disregarded the potential of STEAM Education for addressing inclusion in the classroom. Finally, by showcasing inclusive practices from the field, this book offers not only evidence and reflection on the essential elements of Inclusive STEAM programmes, but also inspiration for future experimentation, and for defining new educational research trajectories, at the intersection between STEAM and inclusive education.

Testimonial Videos

After completing each training programme, participating teachers from preservice and in-service were invited to share their experiences through short testimonial videos. According to the project's proposal six videos were planned for development, however seven videos were produced, exceeding the initial target.

These videos provided a platform for educators to reflect on their learning journey, articulate the knowledge and skills they acquired, and highlight the personal and professional value of the training. By speaking directly about the training sessions, the teachers contributed to the visibility and credibility of the project, playing an active role in its dissemination.


